
SACRED SITES



The huge dome of this 500-year-old church was designed by the famous artist, Michelangelo. At the very top is a cross, a symbol of Jesus.

A

People often write prayers on pieces of paper and put them into cracks in this wall. It's the only remaining part of the ancient Temple of Jerusalem.

D

This House of Worship has a dome and nine sides. Inscribed on it are teachings of Bahá'u'lláh, including, "All the Prophets of God proclaim the same faith."

B

This temple marks the place where Buddha attained enlightenment. The huge central tower is about 180 feet tall.

E

Sixty columns support the main hall of this temple. It is located where Krishna is believed to have lived and ruled His kingdom.

C

For followers of Muhammad, this cube-shaped building in the courtyard of the Great Mosque is the holiest place on Earth.
